Fatima nodded and smiled. "I appreciate the opportunity," she said, "as I've always wanted to be an astronaut, since I was a little girl. I have some important questions, though, for instance, what will it be like, over there?"

"A little cramped," Manny admitted, sheepishly. "When the ship lands, you will have to stay inside for the first few years, because, right now, there is not enough air for you to walk around without a spacesuit. We hope to change that by getting you and your fellow workers to set up agricultural areas to create more oxygen. In ten or fifteen years, you will leave your spaceship without suits, breathe the newly-created Martian air, and welcome the next wave of settlers."

Fatima looked shy and a little worried, saying, "I've never been good socially."

Manny, who had clearly always been *very* good socially, responded, "You'll make friends, and there will be plenty of privacy as everyone will have their own cabin. You will have plenty to read, and TV and movies streamed directly from Earth, though there will always be sports and activities, if you want to meet new friends." Manny had always been good at reading people, and he could tell that Fatima wanted to get away not just from Earth, but also from her shy self.

Fatima responded, as Manny knew she would, positively. She talked about how she always wanted to push herself more to try harder to make friends. A few minutes later, she had decided to accept the offer. Nonetheless, she had one last important question.

"Manny," asked Fatima, "how long are the contracts? I'd like a fifteen-year trip, myself."



Manny, for the first time, had a serious expression as he explained, "Fatima, the advertisements left out one important detail: Mars is a different environment, where the gravity is much lower. Feedback

Answer-Specific Feedback (ASF)

	Trigger	Student-Facing ASF Copy (and optional images)
ASF 1 Student selects "Female roles"	While Fatima is female, her gender role is not a major focus.	
ASF 2	Student selects "being manipulated"	While Manny is not always honest from the start, Fatima knows all the risks by the end.
ASF 3	Student selects "discovering the dangers of technology"	The story does not suggest that technology has gone too far.
ASF 4	Student selects "experiencing disappointment with dreams"	The trip is not exactly what Fatima wanted. The focus is on her duty to her parents, not her personal dreams.

Fatima shows courage in the face of shyness. She accepts the need to take care of her parents. She also <u>eaves</u> her childhood home of Earth. These are all exaggerated parts of the <u>coming of age</u> process. Fatima also accepts that fear of leaving Earth forever is less important than her mother's health problems. This is part of the theme of personal <u>sacrifice</u>.

coming of age	A classic theme that is developed mostly through dialogue, where a character changes from having a childlike, cowardly, and irresponsible to an adult, courageous, and responsible one.
